Established in 1989, Dance Ireland is a membership-led organisation, operating on an all-Ireland basis, dedicated to the promotion of professional dance practice in Ireland. Incorporated in 1992 as a not-for-profit company with limited guarantee, the organisation has evolved into a national, umbrella resource whose core aims are the promotion of dance as a vibrant art form, the provision of support and practical resources for professional dance artists through our training and development programmes and advocacy on dance and choreography issues.

Dance Ireland manages DanceHouse, a purpose-built, state-of-the-art dance rehearsal venue, located in the heart of Dublin's north-east inner city. DanceHouse is at the heart of Dance Ireland activities, as well as being a home for professional dance artists and the wider dance community. Studios are available for hire. In addition to hosting our artistic programme of professional training and development, performances, exhibitions, special events and a fully equipped artists' resource room, DanceHouse offers a range of evening classes to cater to the interests and needs of the general public.

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INTRODUCTION

Happy New Year; welcome to another action-packed issue of *Dance Ireland News*. Enclosed we carry news of performances, tours and training opportunities from our members throughout the country.

Our programme kicks off with three weeks of morning classes taught by International Associate Artist Ted Stoffer; a unique pilot series of writing workshops with Jeffrey Gormly and a members' forum meeting. The full 2010 Dance Ireland programme will be announced in February; in the meantime, the latest information is available from our website: www.danceireland.ie, which also contains online bulletin board, members' directory and calendar.

Performance highlights this month include new works from CoisCéim (Project Arts Centre), Fidget Feet (Civic Theatre, Tallaght) and the Culture Ireland Contemporary Dance Showcase which takes place in New York on 09 and 10 January at the Baryshnikov Arts Center. The showcase coincides with the APAP conference and features work from Daghdha Dance Company, Dylan Quinn Dance Theatre, Fearghus Ó Conchúir and Rex Levitates. Following an Open Call, the programme was selected by a panel comprising representatives from Baryshnikov Center, Culture Ireland, Dance Ireland and Dublin Dance Festival.

What shall we resolve for 2010? What potential does the year hold, and what threats? For most, January is a time for the turning of a new page, a fresh start, new promises, hopes and dreams. It is also a time of fears for the world and those we love. To this end we invite you all to attend a members' forum meeting on Thursday 28 January at 12 noon at DanceHouse. Following on from the series of meetings we hosted last year – members' feedback suggests these gatherings are of enormous benefit – especially at a time of scarce resources and uncertainty. The members' forum meeting is an opportunity to come together, share issues of concern and find support. Also, by that time, we will all have a clearer idea of our funding position for the year and its impact on our plans.

But before we become too focused on the year ahead – we include our 2009 Activity Report. This time last year, we convened a members' meeting and the landscape looked bleak – however as the Activity Report demonstrates – 2009 was another year of growth and development not only for Dance Ireland but for the dance sector as a whole – work got made and seen – albeit on a smaller scale than we would have all liked.

We also enclose your copy of a commissioned essay from dance writer Michael Seaver who presents an interesting take on the current state of dance: *Counting Capital: The Real Value of Dance in Irish Society*. This is the first in a planned series of essays and special events leading up to our 21st anniversary celebrations in 2013.

DANCE COUNTS 2008 update; despite a positive welcome at the AGM for statistical information on the numbers involved in dance activity, we only received a 15% response to our survey questionnaire to date. This is not a usable representative sample.

Just to give a sense of the potential of DANCE COUNTS: *the overall totals line is quite interesting - 15% of our membership spent almost €4 million, hired 235 dancers and employed 227 others. That 15% had audiences of nearly 44,000 and dance class attendances also nearly 44,000. Outreach activities involved more than 15,500 people.*

These are big figures for only 15% response. In order for the survey to have credibility – we need a 50% or greater response. Over the coming weeks we will be in contact, so expect a call or email. We aim to publish the results in February.

PROFESSIONAL MORNING CLASS

Professional morning classes recommence on Monday 11 January with Ted Stoffer teaching daily for three weeks. Ted is one of our International Associate Artists, working in residence at DanceHouse with collaborator Sayaka Kaiwa. This is an excellent opportunity to enter into their choreographic process over a three-week period. The classes will investigate rhythm, resonance, and tension, awareness of space and use of weight.

Professional morning classes, workshops and master-classes will continue throughout the year; we aim to bring you a variety of styles and a range of national and international teachers, including Elizabeth Corbett, Catherine Plomteux, Mariah Maloney and Iñaki Azpillaga. Our 2010 programme will be announced in more detail in February; in the meantime, the latest information is posted daily on www.danceireland.ie.

And for those outside Dublin, we will continue providing access to weekly professional-level classes in Belfast, Cork, Tralee and Wexford, in addition to supporting a number of DARI weekend workshops and other opportunities as they arise, around the country. Further information and contact details on regional classes are available from our website or see class listings on the back page.

And remember, to enjoy the variety and flexibility of our training programme at reduced rates, buy a 5-class card or a 10-class card and use it for any professional morning class or open company class.

Dance Ireland's 2010 programme kicks off with International Associate Artist, Ted Stoffer in residence from 11 to 29 January, working with Japanese dancer Sayaka Kaiwa. A core part of the residency is creative sharing, to this end Ted and Sayaka will also teach morning class for three weeks.

Ted Stoffer formed Aphasia Dance Company in 1998 to create a framework in which to investigate the language of the human body. He believes in observation of rhythms of breath, thought, action, reaction and contemplation in the initiation of one's intent allows for universalism in individual expression. He has danced with Scapino Ballet Rotterdam, Rambert Dance Company, Sasha Waltz & Guests and Les Ballets C de la B. He teaches regularly for Ultima Vez, Rosas, Charleroi Danses, Sasha

Waltz & Guests and conducts various workshops throughout the world.

Sayaka Kaiwa was born in Japan, lived and educated in Japan, Thailand, USA (Hampshire College and New York City) and Belgium. After graduating from P.A.R.T.S. in 2006, she worked as a freelance dancer in Germany, Denmark, and Belgium. In 2008, she became a choreographic assistant to Ted Stoffer and Veronika Riz. She sees physical movement as a basis of communication and dance as a fundamental form of universal expression

The International Associate Artist Programme was established in 2008 to give international dance artists the opportunity to critically reflect on their artistic practice and take time, in residence at DanceHouse, to further develop their own unique artistic process. And at the same time, create opportunities to connect with Irish dance artists. The aim of the programme is to strengthen international contacts, promote creative exchanges and facilitate dialogue among dance artists nationally and internationally.

The International Associate Artist Programme will continue in 2010 with Hanneke Hansen (USA) in residence in the spring and Annabelle Bonnery (FR) in residence in the autumn.

THINKING, TALKING, WRITING DANCE

A pilot writing project, led by Jeffrey Gormly

Dance Ireland wishes to support a community of writers who engage in ideas about their own artistic practice, and the creative work of others across a wide range of disciplines. Jeffrey Gormly, editor of choreograph.net, will bring his experience as writer, dramaturge, editor and cultural producer to a process of discovering while addressing the needs of creative producers.

The aim of the pilot is to identify and address the needs of creative artists around writing. It is acknowledged that there are three general aspects to the use of writing in artistic professional practice and development:

- Writing as process: use of notebooks, reading and research as part of the creation of artistic material;
- Writing as interface: creation of texts for publicity, marketing, and artistic proposals;
- Discursive practices as a means of developing artistic 'working friendships', community and eliciting feedback: blogging, article writing, dialogical and discursive formats.

This pilot will involve raw thinking and talking, note-taking, discussion, and development of a critical, associative field of ideas relating to the particular thoughts and ideas occupying each participant's mind. The programme also incorporates space /time for free dance as an essential and constructive part of an embodied thinking process. The final session of the workshop will include publishing texts and images produced by the participants in a raw thinking thread on choreograph.net, for those happy to do so.

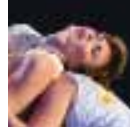

As You Are by Muirne Bloomer

Who would you rather be Superman or Clarke Kent? We all want to stand out from the crowd – but are we willing to pay the price? In Muirne Bloomer's quirky world, six extraordinary individuals are tested to the limit as they struggle for control over themselves and each other.

Faun by David Bolger

Nijinsky was worshipped as the greatest dancer of the twentieth century, but audiences rioted when they saw his first ballet, *L'après midi d'un Faune*. It is hard to tell what shocked audiences most, the bare feet, shameless sensuality or revolutionary dance style. Mixing Debussy's famous score with Queen, David Bolger explores how dance still reconnects us with our feelings and imagination. But if nothing shocks us any more, how can we ever really break free?

Dance Workshops

CoisCéim will be conducting enjoyable dance workshops in which participants can try simple warm-up exercises and dance sequences from the show which are easy to learn and fun to do. Each workshop is led by a professional dancer with CoisCéim Dance Theatre. Workshops can be pitched toward any age group ranging from 14 – 100 years! No prior experience is necessary.

Workshops often take place on the morning of or the afternoon/evening before the date of the show but can be arranged at a date and time to suit individual groups. Workshops are free of charge to groups of 15 or more who have purchased tickets to see the show at their local venue.

Required: well lit, heated space with wooden floor ideally and a 13 amp socket, water to be available for participants. CoisCéim will bring music system.

Dance Talks

Combining slideshow, video screening and movement demonstration, *Dance Talks* is an interactive session led by Philippa Donnellan, Director of CoisCéim Broadreach. The talk discusses Nijinsky's *L'après midi d'un Faun* which caused uproar when first received by the public in 1912. Pushing the boundaries as to how far an artist could go for his art, Nijinsky's ballet is now considered to be one of the greatest achievements in modern theatre. In Bolger's contemporary retelling of the story he transports the themes and emotions of the original to evoke a new, other worldly visual beauty.

Dance Theatre of Ireland continues rehearsals for their 2010 creation *Handle With Care* (working title) which will premiere later this year. Initial research and rehearsals began in November 2009 with dancers Mirjam Gurtner, Cosimo de Tommaso, Iker Arrue, and Laura Vilar. Rehearsals will re-commence with additional collaborators in 2010. The new work, choreographed by Artistic Directors Robert Connor and Loretta Yurick, is about both our vulnerabilities and ecstatic states and the fine line between love and loss, life and death. The programme also includes the commission of a new duet by choreographer Nick Bryson.

In addition, *Block Party!* Dance Theatre of Ireland's outdoor performance which was part of the Dancing Cities network last year in London, has received several invitations from festivals nationally and internationally. The Company will be touring the work, which stars gigantic toy blocks, 6 dancers and 3 drummers, throughout Ireland, UK and Korea in 2010.

Véronique Doisneau was a member of the *corps de ballet* of the Paris Opera Ballet, a career ballet dancer, but never the *étoile*. This work by Jérôme Bel was made as Doisneau was approaching 42, POB's mandatory retirement age. On a bare stage, Doisneau sketches out her life as a dancer. She dances short sections of her favourite works, among them *La Bayadère*, *Giselle* and Merce Cunningham's *Points in Space*. Both humorous and poignant, Bel's film reveals the person behind the facade of the mutely graceful *corps*.

LIADAIN SPERANZA HERRIOTT

Looking Back & Looking Forward

Looking back 2009 has been a busy year for Liadain. Thanks to the support of the Arts Council, she set off to research ancient folkloric dance in southern India. While there she was invited to make a piece for the freshly formed, Bangalore Dance Collective (BDC). In less than three weeks she choreographed a 25-minute series of duets called *Two* which were performed on 28 March as part of BDC's festival, New Trash.

The process of making *Two* was a wonderful experience for Liadain, teaching her about her skills and capacities as a choreographer. Her present inspiration in creating movement stems from observing the gestures that surround us in everyday life. *Two* is a dance theatre piece made about human relationships. One duet is about joy, based on the movement that laughter produces, and the different pitches of laughter. Another is about pain, taking a close look at all that can come from pinching your partner's arm.

Liadain went from Bangalore to Broadway in an exchange with Movement Research, NYC. She showed the next part of her choreographic trilogy, *One*, a solo about being alone, at Dance Theater Workshop. While she was there she also performed with Artichoke Dance Company and Pavel Zustiak's company Palissimo, at Judson Church. She investigated the work at Chez Bushwick and that of Michael Alan (www.michaelalanart.com). Liadain plans to return to contribute to their performance platforms.

*Two*

On returning to Europe Liadain attended an intensive workshop, Deltebre Dansa, run by choreographer and dancer Roberto Olivan (www.deltebredansa.com). She was among one hundred dance and circus artists selected from across Europe to train 6 hours a day in various techniques including yoga, break dance and martial arts over. Twenty five performers were selected to take part in a creation directed by Roberto Magro (director of Torino's circus school) over the two-week period. Liadain took part in creating and performing *Cartoon* - a piece about cartoon as a material versus interpreting what it is to be a cartoon. She wishes to thank the Arts Council for their support which enabled her attend Deltebre Dansa.

In September, Liadain was asked to create and perform a solo as part of an inter-disciplinary festival in Brussels (www.brxlbravo.be). *La Poupette* was presented as part of 2dance4hours, a 24-hour marathon of solos created in the city's beautiful renovated cultural center, Les Brigittines. This event was curated by choreographer and P.A.R.T.S. teacher, David Hernandez with whom she had worked five years ago.

UNIVERSITY OF LIMERICK

Dance Archive of Ireland

The University of Limerick recently announced the establishment of Ireland's first national dance archive to be based at the Glucksman Library. The *Dance Archive of Ireland* will be established through seed funding of €140,000 from the Arts Council and came about through initiatives by *Dance Research Forum Ireland*, a body set up in 2003 by Dr Catherine Foley, Director of the MA Ethnochoreology and MA Irish Traditional Dance Performance at the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance at University of Limerick. Dance Research Forum Ireland received an award from the Arts Council in 2008 to carry out this feasibility report in connection with the establishment of a national dance archive in Ireland.

Dr Catherine Foley, *Chair of the Dance Research*

Forum Ireland said following years of effort, the National Dance Archive of Ireland is now becoming a reality; it is a historic moment for all dance in Ireland. Dance Research Forum Ireland owes an enormous debt of gratitude to the Arts Council for the awarding of this seed funding.

The report, written by dance historian Dr Victoria O'Brien, established the existence of a wealth of dance archival material, which to date has been difficult to access. Since the completion of the feasibility report, Dance Research Forum Ireland together with the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance, the Glucksman Library at the University of Limerick, and the Arts Council have worked together towards the establishment of an accessible dance archive.

Commenting on the announcement, Mícheál Ó Súilleabháin, Professor of Music and Director of the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance at the University said: *The establishment of the Dance Archive of Ireland at the University of Limerick, is a direct follow on from the inspired and inclusive vision of Dance Research Forum Ireland, across ballet, contemporary, traditional, popular and world dance genres.*
